



Iran and Israel Suspend Attacks Following Trump's Call

Iran and Israel have temporarily halted direct attacks against each other following an appeal from U.S. President Donald Trump. Although both sides signaled restraint on Monday, the situation has not yet fully stabilized. According to a Reuters report, Tehran could respond again if Israeli strikes on Hezbollah in Lebanon continue. Warnings have also been issued that tensions may escalate further if attacks on Iran-backed groups do not stop. Late Sunday night, Iran launched missiles toward Israel. Tehran claimed the attack was carried out in response to Israeli strikes on Hezbollah-linked facilities near Beirut. In retaliation, Israel targeted Iran's air defense systems and a petrochemical facility. However, both countries stated that no immediate casualties were reported from the latest exchanges. Commenting on the situation, Trump said both sides appeared interested in moving toward a ceasefire. In a social media post, he noted that discussions were ongoing to restore calm and urged both nations to exercise restraint. Meanwhile, U.S. and Israeli sources confirmed that Trump also held a phone conversation with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu. During the call, Trump reportedly advised Netanyahu to handle the situation cautiously.
